### **PURPOSE**

THE PURPOSE OF THE EBI CONSULTATIVE WORKSHOP IS TO SEEK FEEDBACK ON THE OVERALL AIMS OF THE EBI. THE SPECIFIC OBJECTIVES OF THE WORKSHOP ARE TO:

- Share with experts and stakeholders progress in developing specific recommended practices on four topics:
  - 1) The Business Case -- *Rationale for integrating biodiversity conservation into oil and gas operations;*
  - 2) Biodiversity Conservation Practices -- *Identify and describe management and operational practices that are intended to reduce the operational footprint on the environment - particularly on biodiversity;*
  - 3) Metrics -- *Performance indicators for measuring the positive and negative impact of oil and gas development on biodiversity;* and
  - 4) Site Selection -- *Criteria for deciding whether to undertake activities in ecologically sensitive environments*
- Solicit input on products that would be useful to the work of participating experts and stakeholders interested in integrating biodiversity conservation into oil and gas development and transmission
- Build relationships with key individuals and organizations who can help EBI build the products and communicate the results and recommendations to a wide audience; and
- Establish a dialogue with parties interested in the continued development of the EBI guidelines
